


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General Statistics


The figure below shows the distribution of types of members in the 5 regions. Each childhood education teachers outnumbered other types of members in all the regions.



Estimated % of Types of Members (N=49)




Committee was Affiliated with or was a part of Another Organization (N=51)




Committee had own Chapters (N=51)

Types of Chapters (N=22)







President or Representatives of Committee Attended the OMEP 2017 World Assembly and Conference in Opatija, Croatia (N=52)


41 Committees sent altogether 98 representatives to attend the OMEP 2017 World Assembly and Conference in Opatija, Croatia.





Participation in the Monitoring of the Implementation of the CRC (N=48)




For OMEP Committees of countries that have ratified the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC), most of them had already developed monitoring plans, such as describing efforts to improve quality of ECEC/ECD in practice provisions, both public and private, documenting efforts in their countries to raise awareness about importance of early childhood education as a child's right, and reading the country's most recent report on CRC implementation and following up. Thirteen (27%) of the Committees had not developed a plan.

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3 | Contribution to ECEC/ECD at the Global Level


Contribution to ECEC/ECD at the Global Level (N=51)







A total of 972 academic and early childhood education practitioners, and 314 parents attended the conference.
- Iran: Developing mobile applications for parents of children under 6 and the plan for "An Island for Children" (which the concept taken from child-friendly city).
- Japan: Fukushima Forum in Fukushima prefecture. Launch of the division for Asia Pacific Regional Conference 2019. ESD Symposium in the conference of JSRECCE in Okayama.
- Korea: Organizing a seminar for ECE teachers about "Global Citizen Education: Bridging the World, Bridging the Generation" at Ewha Womans University in Seoul. A number of co-operational childcare centers applied for the ESD Award.

- Active Participation in the 69th OMEP World Assembly and international Conference in Opatija, Croatia 19-24 June 2017.
- Two countries hosted OMEP Regional Assemblies and Conferences in 2015 and 2017.
- New Zealand hosted Regional Assembly and Conference in 2015.
- Hong Kong hosted Regional Assembly and Conference in 2017.
- B Strong relationships among regional organizations, such as ARNEC, UNESCO, and UNICEF
- The 2nd phase of the joint project "Innovative Pedagogical Approach" will be started by ARNEC.
- China established a collaborative relationship with UNESCO Regional Office for Southern Africa to carry out the 2nd phase of Play and Resilience project.

NEKTARIOS STELLAKIS Regional Vice President for Europe: 2017

The year 2017 was just amazing for our Organization, full of activities and challenges for all of our Committees and members. Especially for our region, the issues of investment, quality and assessment or evaluation in Early Childhood Education Care as well as migrant, asylum seeking, refugees and children on move seem to be among the most "hot" ones.

1 | Activities of Regional VP in 2017

Throughout 2017 I had the chance to visit some of our National Committees and participate in their activities: Cyprus, Russia, Poland, Ukraine and of course Croatia were among the counties I had the chance to visit this year. Moreover, in collaboration with CEPPs Executive Director and member of OMEP, Ms Valerie Unite, I organized an event in Geneva Peace Week 2017 in UN Palace of Nations with the title "Interventions to Break the Inter-generational Cycle of Violence". In May I participated in VI International Conference on ECEC, which took place in Moscow and I participated in a forum accompanying our member Dr Natalya Rhyzova. In November, I participated in International Step by Step Association, which took place in Ghent, Belgium. Finally, I would like to mention that in October I welcome Russian Committee in my town where the cultural exchange program between Russia and Greece was presented.

2 | National Committee Activity Highlights

OMEP has a long and proud history in our region, Europe. The wide range of activities of European National Committees and of the region is covered by annual reports of the individual national boards. By studying these reports it is clear that the member countries do organize a number of interesting and useful events and activities benefiting care for and education of very young children. The national boards often focus on organizing conferences and workshops for the wide public and teachers but they also offer specific activities (such as contests, entertainment events, or celebrations) targeting parents or children themselves.

3 | Major Strengths of the Region

We are the biggest group in OMEP family with strong tradition and public recognition. OMEP takes part in public and political dialogues or debates and at the same time advocates for children right to quality ECEC and promotes academic research, in service vocational training for kindergarten teachers or pedagogues and, finally, organizes activities for children and families.

4 | Main Rooms for Improvement

Collaboration among National Committees in the region is always asked. The same applies for collaboration between regions. There are some excellent examples of collaboration between Europe and Africa but I would be happy to see them expanding. Advocacy in country and in international entities are, also, among our duties and we should try to raise our voice for children, families and early childhood education.

Strengthening dialogue with academia is an area that can be improved. We should promote OMEP work and world projects in journals and conferences.

Finally, attracting new members, especially young person, should be set as priority for our region.

5 | Upcoming Plans, Activities and Goals

Since this year we have elections and a new Regional Vice President will be elected, I would like to avoid referring certain activities and goals. There are many things that should be taken care off, many of which remain similar through time. On the other hand, a new person brings new visions and plans and I would be happy to hear new plans and to collaborate with my successor as much as I can.

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The Collective Consultation of NGOs on Education for All Coordination Group

The coordination group's work has focused on developing an action plan for the CCNGO 2018-2019 for ensuring global coordination of SDG4-Education 2030 and promoting high quality and inclusive education and lifelong learning opportunities for all. In the past months, we invited our members to share their respective organizations' work plans and events and identify challenges for the Education 2030 agenda progress to determine best ways to influence SDG4 implementation and what the coordination group will advocate for. We also discussed our potential engagement and contribution to key global and regional civil society-organized events on education as well as an advocacy campaign launched by Global Education Monitoring Report.

The SDG-Education 2030 Steering Committee is a key global consultation and coordination for CCNGO engagement. Our representatives in the Steering Committee were involved in some of outputs being prepared by the various of Steering Committee working groups including Policies and Strategies, Financing of education, Review, monitoring and reporting, Advocacy and communication. Position paper and organization's analytical work in education research and foresight were prepared and shared by our members with the Steering Committee. During its 2018 meeting in Paris, the Steering Committee has identified a number of bottlenecks that continue to hamper progress towards global targets and commitments of SDG4-Education 2030 and provided comprehensive recommendations.

The coordination group would have a face-to-face meeting in Beirut on 7th May to finalize the action plan for the CCNGO 2018-2019. In June, representative of CCNGO would attend a forum on education of migrants and refugees organized by NGO UNESCO Liaison Committee and share CCNGO's insights or suggestions. As a member of CCNGO, OMEP would ensure the inclusion of early childhood development, care and education as an unambiguous priority in global educational plans and agenda.

UNESCO's GAP network 3 on teacher education and professional development, is where OMEP work in cooperation with other NGOs from all over the world. Unfortunately most organisations are focussing on school children, and most common is upper secondary children. The work takes place within each organisation and the sharing take place in webinar organised by UNESCO head quarter. It is seldom or never related to ECEC. And also this year's publication: *Issues and Trends in Education for Sustainable Development* was a disappointment, only one sentence about ECE. Every year there is also a conference or work-shop where all organisations take place. Last year this took place in Ottawa, Canada on the topic of *Peace Education and Global Citizenship*, and this year there will be a workshop in San José, Costa Rica in the end of April called: *Peace and Sustainable Development*. Representatives from OMEP (Glynne Mackey & Ingrid Pramling Samuelsson) will participate in the work-shop, but also in a preconference about Education for Sustainable Living.

OMEP is doing its best to make the voice of young children heard, not the least via the *Early Childhood Recourse Bank* (http://www.eceresourcebank.org) where new information constantly are included.

We also distributed Call for Applications for OMEP's 9th award for ESD projects for 2018, and got 33 applications; 0 from North America, 1 from Africa, 6 form Asia/pacific, 14 from Latin America and 12 from Europe. They were all interesting, fruitful and it becomes obvious that the child's participation and voice get more and more space in the projects. Most applications came from Chile, 7; Turkey, 5; and Croatia, 3. After a careful review we selected the following winners:

Play and Resilience

A China-Africa Collaboration Project for Building a Peaceful and Sustainable Future


Phase 2 of the Play and Resilience World Project was launched in January 2017 under the title "Play and Resilience: A China-Africa Collaboration Project for Building a Peaceful and Sustainable Future". The goal of this project is to enhance young children's resilience and potential to contribute to a peaceful and sustainable future, through awareness raising, tools development, capacity development and community relationship building. The project is implemented in China and three African countries (Nigeria, South Africa and Zimbabwe) and the planned duration is 2.5 years (January 2017 to June 2019).

In China, OMEP China implements the project with UNICEF 's support for two target groups of preschool-age children: left-behind children in Hechi in Guangxi province and migrant children in the Pudong New Area of Shanghai. The intervention takes a quasi-experimental design by screening children's risk factors and socioemotional development and measuring the effect size of the project interventions. In Africa, UNESCO leads the project implementation in support of the respective countries' governments, working with 10 communities that have a high number of deprived, disadvantaged and vulnerable children of 0 to 8 years of age. Children in selected communities are living in very different contexts: the particularly limited access to quality ECCE services (Zimbabwe); high incidence of child poverty and child- or female-headed households in rural, former apartheid homelands (South Africa); or internal displacement as a result of the Boko Haram insurgency and community clashes (Nigeria). The project is being implemented with the national and local governments, so as to complement their existing efforts through capacity development and material production.

The main outputs during the first year of the project implementation are:


- A monitoring and evaluation (M&E) framework for the project drafted;
- Field implementation plans for China and Africa developed;
- A Facilitation Guide for Early Childhood Practitioners published and translated into Chinese;
- In-country consultations of stakeholders and project beneficiaries undertaken;
- · Baseline and needs assessments conducted.

The dissemination of the project and the China-Africa exchange of project experiences are promoted through OMEP's worldwide network of early childhood education practitioners as well as conferences and workshops, such as the OMEP World Conference, annual Play and Resilience Symposia, peer review meetings between the Chinese and African teams.






